DEAN'S LETTER





Victor Fields, Dean

Good News, Bad News. Which would you like first? Ok, the bad.

As many of you already know, our chapter lost one of its long-time members last month with the death of Theodore "Ted" C. Herzel. Ted was the Director of Music and Organist at First Presbyterian Church of York from 1960-1988 and a guiding presence in our chapter. He was an outstanding musician, teacher, colleague and friend to In 1967, the York Chapter was practically non-existent with only a handful of members and very little programming. Through Ted's visionary guidance, our chapter slowly rebounded, grew and began to offer a variety of programs and concerts. Several years ago, the chapter, honored Ted Herzel for his many years of service and dedication to our chapter and to the cause of church music. Former organ students of Ted's returned to York to honor him with an organ recital held at First Presbyterian Church. While Ted was a quiet and private individual by nature, his work to further the cause of church music and organ playing was indeed very public and outspoken. Ted was always present for concerts, programs and services. That's what I will miss the most about Ted, his kind and gentle reassuring way of being a strong and active supporter of our profession.

I will meet with our Executive Board to begin discussions on how our Chapter can best honor Ted Herzel. Perhaps a fund-raising organ concert to establish a music scholarship and to recognize Ted's gifts to our community is in order. First Presbyterian Church is currently undergoing extensive repairs and additions to their Moller organ which hopefully should be completed sometime next summer which leads me to the good news. Our Hunt organ scholarship fund has grown in part thanks to a generous gift that our Chapter has received from Mt. Zion

United Church of Christ. Our retired Chaplain, Rev. Jim Walters. Pastor of Mt. Zion Church and his wife Winnie who retired as the Music Director of the church requested that monetary donations be collected in her honor for her many years of service to the church. She requested the money be given to the YORK Chapter Hunt Scholarship fund. The church has presented our chapter with a generous gift totaling \$1,312.00. Along with \$485.00 from monies that have been received for sponsorship for advertising in our forthcoming membership directory, the Hunt scholarship fund has grown significantly. That's music to my ears! In conjunction with this good news, Menchey Music Inc. would like to establish a program to offer used electronic organs to potential organ students. I will be meeting with Joel Menchey, President of Menchey Music and our member Matt Baldwin, Allen organ salesman for Menchey's to discuss how we can mutually work to attract and offer organ instruction and instruments to young people within our community. This sounds like a win/win combination.

Another winning combination will be our November meeting with organist Matthew Wensel and trumpeter Brent Flinchbaugh offering a workshop and mini-recital of music for organ and trumpet. I hope to see you at our November meeting.

For the most part, church choir directors have to work with the youth and adult singers who walk in the door, many of whom have vocal concerns that get in the way of a pleasing choral sound.
